Mount Zion and Mission Bay Vandalism Suspect

Early in the morning, on Thursday, May 5, 2022, both the UCSF Osher Center for Integrative Health (1545 Divisadero St) at Mount Zion and the Energy Center at the UCSF Medical Center at Mission Bay (1830 3rd St) were vandalized by the same suspect. The suspect damaged multiple exterior windows, but did not shatter the glass, as well as two doors. The suspect did not enter either building, and both buildings remain safe and secure. The suspect and suspect vehicle are shown in the images below, captured by UCSF security cameras. The suspect's vehicle is likely an early 1990s Honda Accord.

Personal Safety Tips:

Suspects look for crimes of opportunity and certain personal safety measures can be followed to minimize your chances of becoming a victim. These are:

- Be vigilant of persons acting in a suspicious manner. Call UCSF PD if a person acting in a suspicious manner is seen loitering on campus.
- Travel in groups whenever possible, especially at night.
- Avoid poorly lit or deserted areas when walking at night.
- Make use of the shuttle and escort services.
- Stay alert to your surroundings; avoid headphone and cell phone use when walking or waiting alone.
- If you are walking to your car, keep your car keys easily accessible, preferably in your hand.
- If you feel you are being followed, go into an open business, and ask for help.
- Keep emergency numbers pre-programmed into your cell phone.
- If you are faced with demands for your money or property, especially from an armed subject, comply with their demands in the interest of your safety.
- Do not leave doors to buildings propped open.
- Prevent tailgating by closing all doors and gates behind you when entering or leaving.

Help fight crime by reporting persons acting in a suspicious manner and/or suspicious activity to UCSF PD immediately—race, gender, and religious affiliation are NOT considered suspicious.
